

The new issue our Veterans are facing in our area is the Army is transitioning to a new MHS GENESIS system. This transition is causing as much as 5 hour wait times for the pharmacy to dispense their medicine! Therefore, we recommend that Veteran's transition their prescriptions to the VA so they can get their medicines through the mail. Just remember that the medications are only prescribed from formulary and there is an approved list of medications. The criteria to transfer your prescriptions to the VA are the following: (1) A Primary Care Provider is assigned to you; (2) You need to take your medical records from the non-VA provider and provide it to your VA health care provider. (3) The health care

provider that is assigned to you should agree with the medication prescribed by your non-VA provider. (4) Your VA health care provider can prescribe a medication recommended by a non-VA provider. Then you will get your medication through the mail without having to wait at a pharmacy! For more information, please contact the VA directly. Women Veterans are you getting your health care at a Veteran Affairs Medical Facility? Women Veterans, it's time to consider getting your healthcare at a VA Medical Center. Women Veterans are the fastest growing group within the Veteran population? VA offers a wide variety of services to our women Veterans including comprehensive primary care, cancer screenings, general health screenings, immunizations, lung health, military exposures, and whole health. VA has designated staff and providers who have specialized training and interest in working with women Veterans

#### Release of the National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report (Sept 19, 2022)

- Among women Veterans, the age-adjusted suicide rate fell by 14.1%, compared to 8.4% among non-Veteran women. The ageadjusted suicide rate for women Veterans in 2020 was the lowest since 2013, and the age-adjusted suicide rate for Veteran men was the lowest since 2016.
- In 2019 and 2020, Veteran suicides decreased in consecutive years by 307 and 343 deaths — the biggest decrease in the suicide count and rate since 2001.
- From 2018 to 2020, the age- and sex-adjusted suicide rate among Veterans fell by 9.7%
- From 2019 to 2020, Veteran suicide rates fell across all racial groups.

Suicide is preventable. It is one of the most serious public health issues facing our Veterans today. It is all our job, reach out to Veterans.

October is Domestic Violence Awareness and Breast Cancer Month. Remember to wear pink or purple in support and awareness.



The term, "intimate partner violence" also called domestic violence is describes as physical, sexual, or psychological harm by a current or former partner or spouse that occurs on a continuum of frequency or severity and does not require sexual intimacy or cohabitation. It includes physical violence, sexual violence, stalking, and psychological aggression by a current or former intimate partner. Intimate partner violence is a significant public health issue among Veterans and civilians. It includes physical violence, sexual violence, stalking, and psychological aggression by a current or former intimate partner.

- 1 in 4 women and 1 in 10 men have experienced sexual violence, physical violence, or stalking by an intimate partner during their lifetime.
- Roughly 10 million people annually experience domestic violence.
- Domestic violence does not have a specific race, age, or gender; it affects women, men and children of all different races, status, religions, and cultures.

## Breast Cancer Awareness (Breast cancer screening guidelines save lives)



The National Cancer Institute estimates 19,250 new reports of breast cancer in 2022, 15% increase of new cancer cases. Lifetime Risk of Developing Cancer: Approximately 12.9 percent of women will be diagnosed with female breast cancer at some point during their lifetime, based on 2017–2019 data. As a result, VA encourages women Veterans to take advantage of the many valuable resources for breast cancer education and early detection.

- VA has adopted the American Cancer Society's breast cancer screening quidelines.
- VA recommends women get yearly mammograms by age 40 and every two for women between 50 and 74 years old.
- Each VA Medical Center has a Women Veterans Program Manager (WVPM) to advise and advocate for women Veterans.

## DAV Legislative (Supports Improve Mammography) DAV supports H.R. 4794 - Making Advances in Mammography

One of every eight women will have invasive breast cancer during her lifetime. Companion legislation, H.R. 4794 the Making Advances in Mammography and Medical Options (MAMMO) for Veterans Act, would improve breast health programs and services available to veterans enrolled for Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) health care. Because women veterans are a minority population within the Veterans Health

Administration (VHA), they must often rely on community partners for gender-specific health services including their breast health. In 2020, one third of all gender-specific cancer treatment and screening for women veterans using VHA took place in the community, and VA does not expect that proportion of care to change in the near future.

Breast health is essential to a woman's overall health, yet there are often barriers to accessing these vital services. According to the VA's most recent budget summary fewer than half of VA's women patients received gender-specific care in fiscal year 2020—these numbers are particularly low (13%) for senior women veterans who are at the highest risk of certain gender-specific cancers, including breast cancer. In addition, only about 79% of VA's medical centers had a full or part-time breast health coordinator, which can hamper access to community mammography services. Anecdotal research also indicates that women receiving care in the community often report dissatisfaction with communication about eligibility for services, scheduling of timely appointments and getting results of completed diagnostic work. These findings suggest the need for a more strenuous breast health effort in VA.

The MAMMO Act would improve mammography services for veterans by requiring the VA to develop a strategic plan for breast imaging services and establishing a tele-mammography pilot program in states without VA mammography services and in locations where the provision of such services is not feasible. The bill would also require VHA to upgrade all mammography equipment to three-dimensional imaging and to study the availability of genetic testing for the breast cancer gene for veterans. These requirements, in addition to studies and increased partnerships with designated providers within the National Cancer Institute network and the Department of Defense should help improve access to high-quality breast cancer care for all women veterans.

DAV supports H.R. 4794 and S. 2533 in accordance with DAV Resolution No. 015, which calls for enhanced medical services, including gender-specific care, and benefits for women veterans.
