The Defense Health Agency (DHA) will take the next step this fall in evolving health care across the military health system, which oversees the care and well-being of some 9.5 million people, including service members and families.

Effective October 1, all military treatment facilities in the United Sates that had previously operated by the Army, Navy or Air Force transitioned to DHA.

Eventually, every military treatment facility will move under DHA, and the agency has opted to manage those facilities by dividing them into a variety of markets.

The large market segment includes about 20 such large markets and about 16 smaller markets.

A move to joint electronic health records is also part of the transformation, making the movement of beneficiary health records between different facilities seamless including the VA.

The Florida Department of Veterans Affairs operates six skilled nursing facilities and one assisted living facility. Two additional skilled nursing facilities are under development. All facilities are licensed by Florida's Agency for Health Care Administration and inspected annually AHCA and the VA. The homes are supervised around the clock by registered and licensed nurses.

Basic admission requirements for all state veterans' homes include an honorable discharge, Florida residency, and certification of need of assisted living or skilled nursing care As determined by a VA physician. For more information call (727) 518 3202 extension 5562.

The Robert H. Jenkins Jr. Veterans Domiciliary Home is located in Lake City. It is a 150-bed ALF.

The Emory L Bennett State Veterans' Nursing Home is located in Daytona Beach. It is a 120-bed facility.

The Baldomero Lopez State Veterans' Nursing is a 120-bed facility located in Land O' Lakes. This facility can accommodate 60 residents with dementia/Alzheimer's.

The Alexander "Sandy" Nininger State Veterans Nursing Home is a 120-bed facility located in Pembroke Pines. This facility can accommodate 60 residents with dementia/Alzheimer's.

The Clifford C. Sims State Veterans Nursing Home is a 120-bed facility located in Panama City. This facility can accommodate 60 residents with dementia/Alzheimer's.

The Douglas T. Jacobson State Veterans Nursing Home is a 120bed facility located in Port Charlotte. This facility can accommodate 60 residents with dementia/Alzheimer's.

The Clyde E. Lessen State Veterans' Nursing Home is a 120-bed facility located in St. Augustine that can accommodate 60 residents with dementia/Alzheimer's.

The Ardie R. Copas State Veterans' Nursing Home is scheduled to open in early 2020 in Port St. Lucie and also will be able to accommodate residents with dementia/Alzheimer's.

While most people find joy, happiness, and good times this time of year, may are going through depression, anxiety, fear and confusion because of service-related memories brought on by PTSD/MST. This can result in suicide. Here are some facts about this terrible tragedy.

More than 800,000 people worldwide commit suicide each year—more than 39,000 each year in the United States. That translates into someone taking their own life every 40 seconds somewhere in the World. Suicide is the 10th leading cause of death in the United States. The true number of suicides is possibly higher because some deaths that were actually thought to be due to an accident, overdose or shooting are not recognized as suicide.. The brave men and women who have suffered losses not only on the battlefield, but from suicide in recent years are in a higher risk of suicide then other groups. According to the United States Department of Veterans Affairs, each day there are between 20-22 veterans who commit suicide. What's more, they report that veteran's suicides account for 18% of the suicide deaths in the United States, while they only make up 8.5% of the adult population. The suicide rates for our veterans and active duty military is around 50% higher than for their civilian counterparts, showing what a serious issue we have on our hands. This group of people have a tremendous amount of stress and they need to know that its not a sign of weakness to seek help. There are programs in place that have been successful at helping to reduce the suicide rates, and we need to expand those to help others around our Nation.

November 5^{tt} of 2019 is Election Day and, as we all know, our National Elections will take place next year in 2020. Whether it be Local or National Elections, it is appropriate that we all should refresh our memories of what participation is acceptable for a DAV member. DAV National has provided a few Dos and Don'ts as well as a summary of the applicable DAV National policies regarding political activities of DAV members.

DAV encourages you, as an individual, to register to vote, to vote in elections and to actively support the candidates of your choice. However, as a member of DAV, you have the responsibility to ensure your activities as a private citizen do not give the appearance that DAV supports or opposes any political candidate. To do so would violate our congressional charter, national Constitution and Bylaws and the law and regulations governing DAV's tax-exempt status.

Dos and Don'ts

DO get involved in political campaigns, rallies, forums and town hall meetings, as an individual. It's your right as an American citizen—and a disabled veteran—to support the candidate of your choice.

DON'T support a candidate, or attend political events in support of a candidate, in the name of DAV, nor should you give the appearance that DAV is supporting a particular candidate. **Wearing DAV caps and shirts can give the appearance of support by the organization.** **DO** hold open candidate forums or town hall meetings so the candidates can discuss their positions on issues affecting disabled veterans, their families and survivors.

DON'T forget to invite all candidates to the open forum/ town hall meeting and make reasonable attempts to accommodate their schedules. It is not necessary that all candidates accept the invitation or attend for you to hold the event or that the candidates appear on the same day or at the same time.

DO make candidates aware of the issues facing wounded, injured and ill veterans, their families and survivors, either as an individual or as a member/leader of DAV or its subdivision.

DON'T forget to review DAV's national resolutions to ensure your position is in line with—and not contrary to or unsupported by—DAV's adopted resolutions when speaking on behalf of the organization.

DON'T forget that, while DAV provides services to all veterans, our legislative goals focus on the betterment of wartime disabled veterans their families and survivors.

DAV National Policies

"The corporation [DAV] shall be nonpolitical and nonsectarian and may not promote the candidacy of an individual seeking public office." Title 36 U.S.C. § 50306.Under the law and regulations governing the Internal Revenue Service (Title 26 U.S.C.), the federal tax-exempt status of certain charitable, nonprofit organizations, including DAV, shall be withheld or removed if they: "Participate or intervene, directly or indirectly in any political campaign on behalf or in opposition to any candidate for public office.

Legislative Report

For the fourth year in a row, DAV is partnering with ABC for the national media campaign. This year, the partnership has expanded to include ESPN and UFC. Parking for Disabled Vetera

Parking spaces for persons with disabilities are for the exclusive use of individuals who have permanent or temporary impairments. (F.S. 553.5041(3)). Disabled veterans who have been issued a "DV" plate may only park in designated handicapped parking spaces if they also have a mobility impairment. Disabled veterans with a mobility impairment may apply for a disabled parking plate with wheelchair emblem to avoid possible fines and penalties. No state agency, county, municipality or agency thereof may charge the driver of a vehicle displaying a "DV" license plate any fee for parking on public, streets or highways or in any metered parking space, There are exemptions to this benefit which may be found in Florida Statute 316.1964. Recently passed legislation also prohibits the governing body of each publicly owned or publicly operated airport from charging parking fees to vehicles displaying certain disabled veteran license plates.

A DV plate alone will not allow a veteran to park in handicapped parking spaces!

In 1862, President Abraham Lincoln signs the bill creating the U.S. Army Medal of Honor which was given to noncommissioned officers and privates for distinguished actions of gallantry in action. The previous December Lincoln had signed a provision creating the U.S. Navy Medal of Valor which formed the basis for the Army medal.

In 1863, the Medal of Honor became a permanent military decoration available to all members of the U.S. military including commissioned officers in all branches. It distinguishes those who have demonstrated valor and risk of life beyond the call of duty in combat.

To date over 3500 Americans have received the Medal of Honor. The Medal of Honor is the oldest continuously issued combat decoration of the United States armed forces. In 1990, Congress designated March 25th as the National Medal of Honor Day. The first American soldiers to be awarded the Medal of Honor were 6 Union volunteers who received the medal in 1862.

Nineteen individuals, all now deceased, were double Medal of Honor recipients.

White House responsible for delayed decision on new Agent Orange diseases.

Two years ago, then VA Secretary David Shulkin decided to add three health conditions to the list of diseases eligible for Agent Orange benefits, but White House officials challenged his authority and impeded enactment, according to internal documents obtained by a veteran through the Freedom of Information Act.

Now tens of thousands of veterans are still waiting.

Secretary Shulkin decided to add three health conditions—bladder cancer, Parkinson's like symptoms and hypothyroidism to the list of diseases eligible for Agent Orange benefits. Heavily redacted emails and briefings released recently to the veteran shows Shulkin made the decision sometime before October 3, 2017—a move that would have given ailing veterans faster access to disability compensation and health benefits.

But the Office of Management and Budget including Director Mick Mulvaney, and other White House officials objected, according to the documents.

While the specifics of the OMB's opposition were redacted, legible portions show that the scientific evidence supporting the proposed additions was limited and it had concerns about budgetary impact of the expansion, as well as any adverse effects on the existing disability benefits program.

According to the documents, roughly 83, 000 veterans are afflicted with one of the three proposed presumptive conditions. The estimated cost for providing disability compensation to these former service members was also redacted.

In 2016, scientists with the Institute of Medicine, now know as the National Academies of Science and engineering and Medicine, found there was "limited or suggestive evidence" linking bladder cancer and hypothyroidism to AO exposure. That represented an upgrade from a previous recommendation that there was

Inadequate or insufficient evidence to link the diseases to the toxic herbicides used as defoliants in Vietnam. The 2016 IOM report also recommended that veterans with "Parkinson's like symptoms" not just those diagnosed with Parkinson's be granted service-connected presumption.


The IOM report was released five-months after a provision in the AO Act of 1991 expired—one that allowed the VA Secretary to prescribe regulations for presumption of service connection for diseases, provided the medical and scientific evidence existed.

In January 2018, Shulkin received an email from OMB, which Shulkin said had the support of Mulvaney that spelled out OMB's objections and made new requests for additional evidence. Shulkin responded to Mulvaney on March 6, 2018, urging him to support the decision.

Nothing as happened except more studies that have been completed but not released including VHA's Vietnam Veteran Morbidity Study and the Vietnam Mortality Study.

Both studies were scheduled to be completed this year, but the results have not been released. In a proposed statement drafted by VA but never released, officials said VA and the administration determined in "late March (2018) that there was insufficient data and information to overcome the limitations in the scientific support for the rulemaking.

These two additional studies could produce additional scientific insights into an association between exposure to AO and stroke, hypertension, hypothyroidism, Parkinson's Disease and bladder cancer the statement noted.

H. R. 1092

To amend title 38, United States Code, to expand health care and benefits from the Department of Veterans Affairs for military sexual trauma, and for other purposes.

This Act may be cited as the "Servicemembers and Veterans Empowerment and Support Act of 2019".

SEC. 2. TECHNOLOGICAL ABUSE DEFINED.

Section 101 of title 38, United States Code, is amended by adding at the end the following new paragraph:

"(37) The term 'technological abuse' means behavior intended to harm, threaten, intimidate, control, stalk, harass, impersonate, or monitor another person, except as otherwise permitted by law, that occurs via the Internet, social networking sites, computers, mobile devices, cellular telephones, apps, location tracking devices, instant messages, text messages, or other forms of technology. Technological abuse may include—

> "(A) unwanted, repeated telephone calls, text messages, instant messages, or social media posts;

"(B) non-consensual access of e-mail accounts, texts or instant messaging accounts, social networking accounts, or cellular telephone logs;

"(C) attempting to control or restrict a person's ability to access technology with the intent to isolate them from support and social connection;

"(D) using tracking devices or location tracking software for the purpose of monitoring or stalking another person's location;

"(E) impersonation of a person with the intent to deceive or cause harm through the use of spoofing technology or the creation of fake email or social media accounts; or

"(F) pressuring for or sharing of another person's private information, photographs, or videos without their consent.".

SEC. 3. EXPANSION OF COVERAGE BY THE DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS OF COUNSELING AND TREATMENT FOR SEXUAL TRAUMA TO INCLUDE TECHNOLOGICAL ABUSE OF A SEXUAL NATURE.

Section 1720D(a)(1) of title 38, United States Code, is amended by inserting "technological abuse of a sexual nature," after "battery of a sexual nature,".
